New P. M. G. Has 36 Years' Service In Postal Department

Appointment of Mr. George Fitzgerald White, former Deputy Postmaster General, to the substantive post vice Mr. E. L. Morris, retired, tops off thirty-six years continuous duty in the Civil Service. Mr. White has been attached to the postal department during his entire career, Born in Kingston on Christmas Eve day, 1894, he was educated at the St. Aloysius School and St. George's College. He joined the Service in July, 1913.

After a short period in the Money Order Branch he was posted to the Circulation Branch as a junior clerk. In 1935, he was heading this important phase of the postal service, and in 1942 he was made Superintendent of Mails.

Mr. White was called upstairs the King Street head office in 1945, receiving the appointment of Deputy Postmaster General. But, he had, meanwhile, served as Postal Censor during World War II.

Regarded as a popular head of department, Mr. White's efficiency and courtesy has won the admiration of the public. Hence the number of congratulatory telegrams and telephone messages to him yesterday.

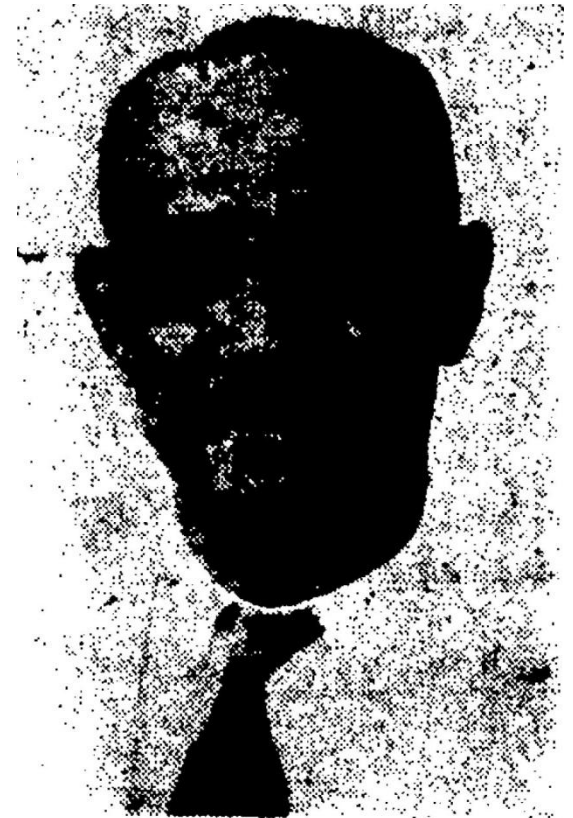

Postmaster General Retiring Soon

Mr. George White Postmaster General. Goes on six months leave of absence on Friday of this week, prior to retiring from the Public Service towards the end of October.

Mr White saw all his service in the Postal Department which he joined in 1913(?). He was Superintendent of Mails from 1942 to 1945. Deputy Postmaster General from 1945 to 1949, when he was promoted to Postmaster General.

During World War II he performed the duties of Postal censor.

White's Murder Trial Opens today

The trial of ex-Postmaster, General George Waite, charged with the murder of six-year-old Rose Marie Cooper, will begin in the No. 1 Rome Circuit Court this morning before Mr. Justice; Fox.

A coroner's jury on June 9, found that. 71 year old White was criminally responsible for the death of Cooper who was found, strangled at their home, 9 Surbiton Road, St. Andrew, on August 23, last year.

He was charged with murder and remanded in custody. But on an application by Mr. Vivian Bloke. Q.C. who appeared with Mr. Emil George of Counsel made on June 30. White was granted bail in the sum of £500 by the Chief Justice the Hon. Sir Rowland Phillips, in Chambers.

Counsel for the defence will be instructed by Mr. Douglas Brandon of Messrs A. E. Brandon and Co.

Mr. Huntley Munroe, Q.C., Director of Public Prosecutions, will conduct the prosecution's case.
