| <p>18190206 WI Packet (Dominica)</p> <p>WEST INDIA PACKET AND MAIL-BOAT ESTABLISHMENT. FROM THE DOMINICA ALMANAC.</p> <p>Of the two Packets, which arrive at Barbados monthly from Europe, the first is bound for Ja- maica. After remaining 48 hours at Barbados she sails for St. Lucia, lands the Mails for that island, but without any delay, and then pro- ceeds to Martinique, where she remains twenty- four hours, after which she prosecutes her voy- age without further interruption.</p> <p>Upon the day following the arrival of this Packet at Barbados, at 4 P. M. two Mail Boats are dispatched as follows:—</p> <p>One takes the Mails for Tobago, Trinidad, Grenada, and St. Vincent's; The Trinidad Mails are landed at Macaripo, so that the Mail- Boat does not go up the Gulph, or afford any opportunity for Passengers to or from Port d'Espagne—proceeding to Grenada and St. Vin- cent's, she fetches back the Island Mails to Bar- bados.</p> <p>Another takes the Mails for St. Lucia, Domi- nica, Guadeloupe, Antigua, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Kitt's, and the Leeward Islands. Upon her arrival at Antigua, one of the Mail Boats, be- longing to the Leeward Station, proceeds with the Mails to Montserrat, Nevis, and St. Kitt's— while the Mail-Boat from Barbados returns with the Island letters to Barbados, calling on the way at every Island.</p> | <p>The second monthly Packet, which arrives at Barbados, remains 48 hours in Carlisle Bay, and then proceeds on her route among the Islands, seldom reaching Antigua before the expiration of twelve days; upon her arrival there the Lee- ward Island Mails are occasionally dispatched by the Government Vessel. At 4 P. M. on the day succeeding her arrival at Barbados, two Mail-Boats are dispatched as follows: One pro- ceeds to Port d'Espagne, Trinidad, and, having taken on board the Mails for Europe, proceeds to Grenada, where she awaits the arrival of the second Mail-Boat, which started at the same time for Tobago, St. Vincent's, and Grenada.— After meeting, one of the Boats proceeds with her European Mails from Trinidad, Tobago, St. Vincent's, and Grenada, to St. Kitt's, which last island she generally reaches about the same time with the Packet, on board of which she deposits her Mails; or, if she be not arrived or be gone, she leaves them at the Post-office. The other Mail-Boat returns direct from Grenada to Barbados.</p> |
