specie on board, and was to sail in six days for that port.

The shallop Cohens' Brothers belonging to the brig  
Canadian Packet, loading at Alligator Pond, found-  
dered on the 9th inst. about six miles from thence.—  
The men saved themselves in a boat they had along  
with them.
