TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better regulation of

colonial posts."

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the post-office."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant under their hands, bearing date the 11th day of October, 1843, did make certain orders and regulations for the transmission of letters by the post in the

British colonies in the West Indies.

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made as to the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this present Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute, in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:

1. The postage of all letters posted in the island of Jamaica, addressed to any place within such island, shall in every case be paid, at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by being duly stamped with the proper postage-stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed, or appear on the outside of every such letter, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of

the postage duty payable thereen.

2. If any letter sent, or tendered or delivered in order to be sent, by the post, between places in Jamaica, shall be posted in that island without the postage being paid thereon either in money or by postage stamps, or having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable by law, every such letter shall be forwarded charged in the first-mentioned case with the full amount of postage to which such letter would be liable by law, together with the further and additional rate of four pence, and charged in the second-mentioned case with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed

thereto, and the postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid, together with the further and additional rate of four pence.

3. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders, directions, or regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations in lieu thereof.

(No. 74.) ATLANTIC-UNITED STATES.

Alteration of Barnegat Light.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that the new light tower on the south side of the entrance of Barnegat inlet, New Jersey, is nearly completed, and that on and after the 1st of January 1859, a light will be exhibited therefrom, when the fixed light at present shown will be discontinued.

The new light will be revolving, showing a bright flash of the natural colour every 10 seconds, placed at an elevation of 165 feet above the sea, and visible in ordinary weather from a distance of 22 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be dioptric, or

by lenses, of the first order.

The light tower is of brick; the upper half is of the natural colour of the brick; the lower half is white, and the lantern is painted black. The whole is 153 feet in height, and its approximate position is in lat. 39° 45′ 49" N. long. 74° 6′ 5" West of Greenwich, according to the U.S. Coast Survey.

Beacon Lights at Amelia Island, Florida.

Also, that on and after the 1st of November, 1858, two lights will be exhibited from beacons erected on the north front of Amelia island, on the east coast of Florida, to guide vessels into the entrance of Fernandina harbour.

The seaward light will be a fixed white light, placed at an elevation of 60 feet above the sea. The beacon is a wooden framework structure,

painted red.

The inner light will be also fixed and white, but elevated 35 feet above the level of the sea. The beacon is on a dwelling-house painted white with a red roof.

The illuminating apparatus of both lights is by lenses of the sixth order.

The beacons should be visible in ordinary weather from a distance of 6 miles.

Directions.—To enter Fernandina harbour, bring Amelia island main light to bear S.W. or W.S.W. in 7 fathoms water, and steer for it until the beacons are in range or line W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.; then proceed in with them so, until up with the inner buoy.

Alteration of Pass à l'Outre Light, Mississippi.

Also, that on the 1st of January 1859, the present fixed light varied by flashes, on Middle Ground island, on the north side of the entrance to the Pass à l'Outre into the Mississippi river, will be changed to a fixed white light.

Light Vessel off Handherchief Shoal—Vineyard Sound.

THE United States Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on and after the 15th of October, 1858, a light vessel would be stationed off the Handkerchief shoal, which lies off Monomoy point, Massachusetts.

The light is a fixed white light, shown all night. The light vessel is schooner rigged, and carries a black oval day mark at each masthead.
