Note (a).—If the Homeward Mails, &c., are embarked in time, and the Packet be in all other respects ready, she may start from Colon the previous evening, but the departure from Jamaica homeward is not to be accelerated, unless from Quarantine or other causes the Packet may have to coal at another Port, in which case she may leave Jamaica as soon as she is ready.

Note (b).—If either of the Steamers on the Branch Routes has not reached Barbados, the Packet is to await the arrival of the missing Vessel two clear days, if necessary; otherwise the Packet is to start for England the moment the Mails, &c., from the several Branch Packets and from Barbados have been received on board, and she is in all respects ready for sea.

Honorable Legislative Council.

At a meeting of the Legislative Council of Jamaica, held pursuant to adjournment at Head Quarter House, in the Town of Kingston, on Monday the 29th day of October, 1888,

The minutes of the meeting of the 24th day of October, 1888, were read and confirmed.

THE HONORABLE COLONEL FREDERICK BENJAMIN PRICE WHITE, Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of Her Majesty's Troops in Jamaica, being present, was duly sworn and took his seat as an ex-officio member of the Council.

MR. J. M. FARQUHARSON gave notice that at the next meeting of the Council he would ask the Colonial Secretary for a Return of the amounts received by the several parishes out of the Parochial Road Reserved Fund for the five years ending 30th September last.

MR. HARVEY for Mr. Craig gave notice that at the next meeting of the Council he would move that the Attorney General be added to the Select Committee of the Council on the Message of His Excellency the Governor on the valuation of Real Property of this Island.

MR. HARVEY for Mr. Bourke gave notice that at

the next meeting of the Council he would ask leave to introduce a Bill entitled A Law to amend the Incumbered Estates Law, 1873.

MR. C. S. FARQUHARSON presented the Report of the Select Committee to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Governor on Packet Mail Service, which was read and is as follows:—

The Select Committee of the Council to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Governor relating to the Postal Mail Service,

REPORT—

That in the opinion of the Select Committee some alterations are desirable in the present Mail Service, and, so far as the Committee has been able to ascertain, the community desire the Service to be expedited by at least three days.

The R. M. S. P. Company have hitherto and are now implementing their contract most satisfactorily, having, as a rule for some years past, delivered the Mails one or two days before contract time, and the Committee has reason to believe that in place of requiring till Monday to deliver the Mails, as under the existing contract, the Company, with their new and improved vessels, would have no difficulty in landing them on Friday morning.

The Committee therefore recommends that in any new contract this stipulation should be made, that is to say, that the Steamers leaving Southampton as now every alternate Thursday should be due here every alternate Friday, thus making the passage in, say, 14½ days as against the present contract time of 17½ days.

With reference to the present arrangement of every Mail Steamer calling at Barbados, the Select Committee is of opinion that unless the Quarantine Regulations in force at that Island are so relaxed and amended as to remove the serious inconvenience and loss they now occasion the new contract should expressly stipulate that the itinerary of the direct Mail Steamers be altered so as to omit the Port of Barbados altogether.

Equally strong objection, in the opinion of the Committee, should be made in regard to the transfer of the Head Quarters of the Mail Service to Trinidad, an arrangement which would undoubtedly be most injurious

to Jamaica, and which the Committee thinks should be resisted to the utmost.
