PENDING the arrival of a supply of Postal Orders in the usual form, the Governor has approved of the temporary use of a new form for all denominations, which will be prepared locally, and which will be stamped with the counterstamping die originally used by the Stamp Commissioner. No Postal Order of the new form not bearing that stamp will be valid.
