## REVENUE COMPARED WITH ESTIMATES.

# COMPARATIVE COLLECTIONS.

The following is a comparison of the various heads of Revenue Collections for 1908-09 with the similar collections for 1907-08 and 1906-07.

From the above statement it will be seen that there has been a falling off in the gross Revenue of

£471 as compared with the previous year.

This is principally due to a decrease of £179 in Money Order Commissions and £269 in the Revenue collections of the Telegraph Service. The large drop in the Money Order Commissions is accounted for by the high bank rates ruling during some portion of the year 1907-08, and our having in consequence done a much larger money order business during that year.

We have no reasons to be dissatisfied with the revenue collected during the year, as it has realized

the sum of £40,795.

This shows a saving on the appropriation by the Legislature for these services, of £577; and a

net earning of £6,562.

As I pointed out in my last Annual Report no charge is made against the Post Office for conveyance of mails by the Direct Line Mail Steamers, but taking for the reasons I then gave £700 as a fair charge the total expenditure of the Department during the past year would have been £34,933 which compared to the gross carnings of £40,795 plus £2,500, the estimated value of free official postage, would exhibit a net earning of £8,363.

This statement while showing a total excess of collections on Miscellaneous Revenue Account of £78 Ss. 14d., due to increases in rent paid for private letter boxes and contents of unclaimed letters carried to general revenue, shows a decrease of £55–11s. 4d. on accrued postage on Parcels Post between the United Kingdom and Jamaica.

# DISTRICT POST OFFICES.

The following new Post Offices were opened during the year.

Above Rocks, Parish of St. Catherine, on the 4th August, 1908.

Kellits, Parish of Clarendon, on the 3rd September, 1908.

Coleyville, Parish of Manchester, on the 22nd September, 1908.

Alderton, Parish of St. Ann, on the 11th November, 1908.

Belfield, Parish of St. Mary, on the 18th November, 1908.

A Post Office and Telephone Station was opened at Port Morant in the Parish of St. Thomas, on the 24th April, 1908.

Flint River Post Office in the Parish of Hanover was closed, and a Post Office was opened at Sandy Bay in the same parish, on the 12th June, 1908.

The District Post Office at Flint River was re-opened on the 24th September, 1908.

The Post and Telegraph Office usually established at Titchfield Hotel, Port Antonio, for the benefit of Tourists, was opened on 28th December, 1908, and closed on 10th April, 1909.

The Post Office at Cross Keys in the Parish of Manchester, was temporarily closed on the 30th

December, 1908, and re-opened 11th February, 1909.

The Ginger Hill Post Office in St. Elizabeth, was closed on the 1st December, 1908.

The Post and Telegraph Office at Up-Park Camp was removed on the 4th January, 1909, to Cross Roads, a site more convenient for serving the needs of the District.

All the District Post Offices were inspected during the year.

From these figures it will be seen there has been an increase during the year under review, over the previous year, in the number of letters and post cards dealt with of 26,626, while the registered letters, have increased by 5,982.

The number of insured letters received was 50 of the declared value of £1,226 16s, 11d, and the number despatched was 36 of the declared value of £3,547 17s, 11d.

In the 26th paragraph of my last Annual Report I referred to the fact that the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company had entered into a contract with the Imperial Government for the maintenance of a fortnightly service between Southampton and New York via Barbados, Trinidad, La Guayra, Savanilla, Carthagena, Colon and Jamaica; this service has been maintained, but since January, 1909, no mails have been despatched form Jamaica to New York and the Central American Ports by means of this service owing to differences which have arisen between the Company and the Government on the question of compensation.

The usual opportunities for the exchange of mails with the United States and Central American Ports by the steamers of the Hamburg-American Line and the United Fruit Company have offered during the year and have been taken advantage of.

The monthly steam service under subsidy to the Cayman Islands recorded in the 28th paragraph of my last Annual Report, was discontinued with the voyage on 24th April, 1909 owing to the fact that the Agents did not find it sufficiently lucrative to renew the Contract at the same rate; this Department has again therefore to rely on trading schooners for the exchange of mails.

The cost of the conveyance of mails abroad, adding £700 as the payment to the Imperial Direct West India Mail Company, and including Transit Rates, was £2,911.

# MAIL CONVEYANCE INLAND.

The Inland Mail Services have been efficiently conducted by the Public Works Department and by certain of our contractors under the control of this Department, at a cost of £9,243 or £198 more than in 1907–08.

# MONEY ORDERS.

In the Appendix to this report is given a comparative table of the result of the Money Order transactions. A summary of the figures of the year under review shews that Jamaica issued 8,143 of the aggregate value of £23,898 2s. 0d., while the issues of other countries payable in Jamaica were £17,326 of the value of £55,207 15s. 4d.

The above transactions on comparison with 1907–08 shew a decrease in our issues of 1,798 orders to the value of £15,501–15s. Sd., and an increase in the orders payable in Jamaica of 4,332 to the value of £9,249–14s. 7d.

The net commission which accrued to this colony as a result of the above transactions is £459 6s. 0d., and is about £179 less than the year 1907-08.

A direct Money Order Exchange between Jamaica and Costa Rica came into force on the 1st August, 1908. POSTAL ORDERS.

PARCELS POST.

The Parcels Post transactions for the year are recorded in the tabular statement attached, and disclose on comparison with the parcels received during the two years preceding a decrease of 4,708, and an increase of 4,433 respectively, in 1907-08 and 1906-07.

A system of insurance of parcels and a cash on delivery service were introduced on 1st August,

No cash on delivery parcels were despatched, but the number received were 48 with trade charges amounting to £82 1s. 6d. £78 18s. 5d. of which being collected and remitted to the senders of the parcels during the year. £2 0s. 1d. remaining uncollected.

Of the parcels despatched to the United Kingdom as shewn in the foregoing statement, 50 were insured to the value of £459 4s, 0d. Postage accrued as a result £1 12s, 64d. Of those received from the same place 786 were insured to the value of £4,336 4s. Id. Postage accruing £1 16s. 9\frac{1}{2}d.

TELEGRAPHS.

The number of Telegraph and Telephone stations in existence at the end of the year under remark was 75, including the Head Office.

The following new Telegraph and Telephone Offices were opened— Sandy Bay in Hanover, on 1st June, 1908. Telegraph Office. Port Morant in St. Thomas, on 24th April, 1908, Telephone Office.

The usual returns of messages sent and received at each Telegraph station is attached, 103,471 is the total of the summary against 109,115 in 1907–08 or a decrease of 5,644.

The collections on account of Foreign Telegrams were £2,839 12s. 4d. on behalf of the Direct Cable Company and £148 19s. 5d. on behalf of the West India and Panama Telegraph Company, Limited, The training of Candidates for the Post and Telegraph Service was carried out at the School of

Telegraphy at the Head Office, in an efficient manner.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Mr. E. N. Marshall, Travelling Supervisor of District Post Offices resigned his appointment on the 1st March, 1909, on account of ill health after a service of 37 years. The Department has lost an efficient zealous Public Officer whose thorough knowledge of Postal matters was invaluable.

To relieve the congestion of the Circulation Branch of the Kingston Office, in the latter part of September, 1908, the lower floor of the old Supreme Court Office was repaired and handed over to the Post
