4. The total excess of revenue as disclosed above, compared with the year 1909-10 is £3,504. Estimating the value of free official postage at £2,500, and this is a very conservative estimate, the total receipts for the year would be £48,413.

5. On referring to the items above it will be observed that there has been an increase of £3,224 and £173 in Postage and Telegraph collections, respectively, on comparison with the similar collections in 1909-10, there was also a steady increase in local commission charged on British Postal Orders, and the commission on local Postal Orders.

6. Included under the head of "Miscellaneous" are recurring items of rent for Private Boxes, subscriptions for Private Letter Bags and detention fees, yielding £158 12s. 3d. Surplus cash, Parcels Post accrued postage, value found in unclaimed Dead Letters and fees collected on cash on delivery parcels aggregating £780 14s. 6½d.

7. The financial growth of the Department is illustrated in the following return, the Revenue collections being displayed for three periods in breaks of ten years. It is interesting to observe that while between 1890-91 and 1900-01 the Revenue only increased by some £2,883, between 1900-01-1910-11, it increased by nearly £19,000. The records show that from 1905-06 to the present date the Post and Telegraph Revenue has been steadily increasing.

COMPARATIVE EXPENDITURE.

9. A comparison of the expenditure for three years is shown hereunder and discloses a total excess of £5,372 on the expenditure in the year 1909-10. This is due to excess on nearly every item of expenditure in consequence of the continued expansion of the Department, and to the taking over by the Public Works Department of the Northside and Windward mail contracts—entailing a very large initial outlay for mules and vans.

The former service had been performed satisfactory for a great number of years by Mr. A.

W. Douet, who on the expiry of his contract asked to be relieved of it.

DISTRICT POST OFFICES.

13. The following new District Post Offices were opened during the year:

Long Bay, parish of Portland, on 18th August, 1910
Latium, parish of St. James, on 18th August, 1910
Crooked River parish of Clarendon, on 24th August, 1910.

14. It was found necessary during the year to remove the undermentioned offices from the Railway owing to the Station Agents not being able to cope with the work of both Departments.

Montpelier on 20th April, 1910. Cambridge on 14th June, 1910. Albany on 27th February, 1911.

These Post Offices are now entirely under the control of this Department.

15. The name of the Clifton Post Office was changed to that of St. Peters on the 31st March, 1911.

16. During the year under review all Post and Telegraph Offices were inspected by the Supervisor.

17. The three new offices opened this year makes the total number 182. While on the subject of the opening of new District Post Offices I would like to call attention to the fact that though the Government are ever ready to open an office for the convenience of a District it must be assured of the real necessity for the office and a guarantee given against loss.

18. On the removal of the Department to the new Public Buildings a letter box was erected at the corner of Duke and Harbour Streets, and Miss Burke of the Women's Self Help

appointed a Vendor of stamps, which provided for the public in this vicinity.

22. Irrecoverable postage on unclaimed mail matter amounting to £43 7s. 3d. was written off during the year, and the number of packets containing value amounting to £319 14s. 3½d. was 40,060 which were returned under registered cover to the writers.

23. At paragraph 11, the item "Rent of Private Letter Boxes" will be observed under the head of Postal Miscellaneous.

As the demand for these boxes increases annually I am compelled to take this opportunity of urging on the subscribers the necessity for taking such steps as will impress on their employes the need for the exercise of the greatest care in the handling of their correspondence. The boxes after having been cleared should be carefully locked and the keys taken out and not left in the lock (as is fast becoming the custom) and on return of the Clerk performing this duty, the subscriber should see that the key is deposited in a safe place of keeping. The Department makes every effort to keep watch over these boxes, and closes the door, or returns the keys (as the case may be) to the subscribers.

It can be readily understood the risk that is run by leaving a key in a box-even for a short time.

MAIL CONVEYANCE-OCEAN.

25. The number of transit mails which passed through the Department during the period under review was 620.

26. The Elder Dempster Company maintained their contract, fortnightly service, between Bristol and Jamaica during the year until the 26th January, 1911, when the s.s. "Port Kingston" made her last voyage home, after which this service was withdrawn. This Company was responsible for the mails despatched and received described in the above return as "Contract."

27. The Elders and Fyffes offered a weekly service via Bristol which has been taken advantage of, particularly for the conveyance of parcels as all for and from the Mother Country are sent direct and not via the United States.

28. The Royal Mail Steam Packet Company continued to convey mails as usual with the Sister Colonies in the West Indies, etc.

The steamers of the Hamburg-American Line and the United Fruit Company have again afforded regular opportunities for the despatch of mails to the United States and Central America.

29, £3,453 has been paid for the conveyance of mails abroad, this does not include the service rendered by the Direct Line, taking £530 as an estimate based on the gratuity payment for the nine months, the cost of this service would have been £3,983 and is £1,147 in excess of the similar payment for 1909-10.

MAIL CONVEYANCE-INLAND.

- 30. The cost of the Inland mail services which were principally conducted under the supervision of the Public Works Department is £13,130: this increased expenditure is in a measure dealt with in paragraph 9 of this report, and is also due to the extension of the mail service
 - 31. All contracts with the Department were efficiently maintained.

MONEY ORDERS.

32. A statement of the transaction of the Money Order Branch for the year, in compari-

son with similar transactions for the preceding two years is attached to this report.

- 33. On reference to this statement it is interesting to observe the increased issues of money orders to the Dominion of Canada and to Grand Cayman, although the total Jamaica issues was 2,274 less in number and £2,367 8s. 10d. in amount than in the previous year, while payments on account of the issues of other countries payable in Jamaica were 4,196 more in number and £6,961 3s. 5d. more in amount, this increase is due principally to remittances from the Canal Zone.
- 34. The proportion of commission which accrued to Jamaica as a result of these transactions is £387 10s. 6½d.
 - 35. Money Order exchange was established between Jamaica and St. Thomas, D.W.I.

37. The following is the total amount of Postal Orders sold for three years.

38. This displays an increase over last year of £2,891, showing clearly the extensive use of these orders, therefore I cannot regard it as amiss to again urge the necessity of using every precaution in sending these orders through the Post, having due regard to the fact that they are as negotiable as Bank Notes.

PARCELS POST.

- 39. Appended to this report is a comparative statement for the last three years of the Parcels Post transactions. It will be observed that the parcels imported into the colony from various countries with which an exchange exists are 4,751 in excess of the similar importation last year, the declared values of these parcels were £38,704 and the duty assessed £6,014—the actual collection of duty which was transferred to the Revenue Department during the year was £5,835 6s. 10d, or £447 13s. 0d. in excess of 1909-10.
- 40. The Insurance System of parcels has increased very considerably in the year, 1,770 parcels with an insured value of £8,422 7s. 4d. were received, thus showing an increase of 413 parcels and £2,120 7s. 4d of insured value in excess of similar transactions last year.
- 41. The cash on Delivery System has also shewn an increase, 805 parcels with Trade Charges amounting to £1,407 12s. 9d., as against 395 parcels and Trade Charges £679 3s. 4d. for last year.

The fees collected by the Department for the remittance of these collections by Money Orders and British Postal Orders amounted to £12 12s. 11d. or £8 4s. 5d. in excess of last year.

42. The following tabular statement of the insured parcels and the Cash on delivery parcels shows the transactions under these two heads, in comparison with the period under review and the year ended 31st March, 1910.

43. The amount for fines collected under the regulation on parcels detained as undervalued was £3 12s. 3d.

44. The total number of parcels despatched during the year was 8,211 and is 819 in

excess of last year.

45. It will be observed that every item under this head displays a very considerable increase.

46. The Cash on Delivery System was introduced between Jamaica and St. Vincent.

TELEGRAPHS.

47. Attached to this report is the annual return of messages sent and received, the total being 134,626 as against 112,515 in 1909-10 or an increase of 22,111, this increase is due largely to the introduction of sixpenny telegrams on the 1st January, 1911, as well as to the number of offices being increased from 77 to 83, the Revenue for this year being £6,942 as against £6,769 for 1909-10, also showing an increase of £173.

48. Below is a comparative statement for the three months from the 1st January, 1911, to the 31st March, of the number of messages sent and the Revenue, the latter displaying a decrease of £215 4s. and the former an increase of 12,170 messages sent over the wire.

49. While the Revenue at present displays a falling off, it will be observed that each individual month of the period under review has a tendency to increase, and I have no cause to doubt that a greater test period will diminish the decrease. In order, however, to cope with the increased work extra expenditure has been incurred, but owing to its being embodied in the Postal expenditure it is impossible to arrive at the total actual cost.

MISCELLANEOUS.

52. During the year His Excellency the Governor considered it desirable, in the interest of the general health of the Public, that Quinine should be sold at all Post Offices at the moderate rate of five grains for a farthing. This was carried out in November, 1910, and while I am not able to report on conditions of health, I am in a position to state that the procuring of this drug has been fully taken advantage of in every district of the Island.

53. The General Post and Telegraph Offices were transferred to the present buildings on the 24th October, 1910, and as it is the first time in my recollection that this Department has been properly housed it is a matter for comment how the work was carried on heretofore, with the enormous growth of the Department, I can only say that it is fortunate that such provision has been made, the Public I am sure as well as the Staff must appreciate the convenience of these premises.

54. The staff of male and female employees in the General Post and Telegraph Offices, Kingston, and the staff at the District Post Offices have performed their duties in a creditable

manner during the year.
