I have the honour to submit the forty fourth report on this department for the year ended 31st March, 1912.

4. From the above statement it will be seen that the revenue of the year under review exceeded that of 1910-11 by £2,809 4s. 9½d., and if we add the value of official postage, estimating it at the very conservative sum of £3,000 the total earnings of the Post Office reached £51,722 14s. 5½d. The foregoing statement also discloses the fact that during the three years named the revenue of the department has steadily increased to the extent of £6,312 16s. 7¼d.

Several improvements were instituted during the year for the more efficient despatch of the work, and to facilitate the public. The electric stamping machine which was introduced in February of this year has proved a great benefit; several district offices have been opened and telephone offices established the lines of ride between several offices have also been improved by van services in lieu of foot couriers.

 On referring to the items of revenue it will be observed that there has been an increase of £2,900 15s. 04d. and £166 9s. 14d. in postage and telegraph collections respectively. It will be remembered that in last year the reduced rates on telegrams were only in existence during the last quarter of the year, it is therefore apparent that this increase in the revenue has fully justified the reduction, and has been appreciated by the public. The details of this will be dealt with later on. There was also a steady increase on commissions on Local and British postal orders, and money orders, miscellaneous being the only item shewing a falling off, but I think this may be regarded as not of much importance.

 Included under the head of miscellaneous are recurring items of rent for private letter boxes, subscriptions for private letter bags and detention fees yielding £171 12s. 6d. or an increase of £13 0s. 3d. on last year, the other items being surplus cash, value found in dead letters, fines, etc., aggregating

£412 17s. 8d. or £367 16s. 10½d. less than last year.

RETROSPECT.

8. The financial growth of the department is illustrated in the following return, the revenue being displayed for three periods in breaks of ten years. It will be observed that while the increase in 1901-02 over 1891-92 is only £4,420 the increase in 1911-12 over 1901-02 is no less a sum than £20,202. This speaks volumes for the growth of the department.

The item for mail conveyance displays a decrease of £1,255, this decrease did not entail any reduction in the facilities enjoyed by the public, but is attributable to an expenditure for vans and mules during the previous year when the Public Works Department took over the northside and windward mail services, which was not reprovided.

14. This total compared with 1910-11 is less by £353 14s, 7½d, and is dealt with in paragraph 8 of this report, the chief items viz., letter boxes and bags show an increase. As the demand for the boxes steadily increase, I venture to call attention to paragraph 23 of last year's report, although I am glad to say the employees of the subscribers have been much more careful this year, and there has been a decrease in complaints.

- 16. The seven new offices opened this year makes the total number of Post Offices, 189, I have during the year endeavoured to give close and careful consideration to all applications made for the opening of new offices, being fully alive to the importance of a post office as an aid to the development of a district.
- 17. I regret to record that the Laughlands office was closed from the 21st July to the 23rd August of the year under review, owing to the death of the Postmaster. Great trouble was experienced in obtaining a responsible Postmaster to fill his place.

18. During the year under review all post and telegraph offices were inspected by the supervisor,

and I am pleased to report that in no case were any serious irregularities discovered.

19. Books containing penny stamps to the value of two shillings interleaved with advertisements were introduced, they form very convenient means of carrying stamps, and judging from the sale, have been much appreciated. Owing to the demand it has been decided to make these books more useful by the introduction of half penny stamps as well, these stamps will be contained in the next issue now on order. 32. It will be seen that there has been a large increase over the corresponding period of the pre-

ceding year in the number of vessels and mails Inwards and Outwards.

33. The mail services with the Mother Country have been maintained, in the absence of a contract. chiefly via the United States of America, by the vessels of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co., the United Fruit Co., the Hamburg American Co., and the Elder's and Fyffes direct weekly service. All these companies provide an excellent service. The latter is used more particularly for the conveyance of parcels, no parcels for the Mother Country being sent via the United States of America.

34. The steamers of the Hamburg American Line and the United Fruit Co. have again afforded

regular opportunities for the despatch of mails to Central America.

35. The Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. continued to convey mails as usual to and from the Sister Colonies in the West Indies.

36. Mail exchanges with the Cayman Islands, i.e., Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac have been

effected by means of Schooners trading between Kingston, Montego Bay and Lucea.

37. Advantage has been taken of every opportunity for the early despatch of mails, and the cost to the Colony for maintaining the several mail exchanges during the year was £3,800, an increase over last year of £347.

MAIL CONVEYANCE-INLAND.

38. The cost of the mail services which were principally conducted under the supervision of the Public Works Department was £11,528 or £1,602 less than last year, the decreased expenditure is referred to in paragraph 12 of this report.

39. During the year the undermentioned services were established for the further improvement of the mail conveyance. On the 19th June 1911 Foot Post was established between Montego Bay and

Montpelier, giving an additional delivery to that of the train mail.

40. The following van services were also established, Mandeville and Cross Keys, Green Island via Lucea, Lucea and Say.-la-Mar via Grange Hill and Riverside.

41. All contracts with the department were efficiently maintained.

Money Orders.

42. A statement of the transactions of the Money Order Branch for the year compared with similar

transactions for the preceding two years is attached to this report.

43. On reference to the statement, it will be observed under the item Jamaica issues, a falling off with the United Kingdom, this I am of opinion is due to the increased sale of British Postal Orders which in many cases are more advantageous to the remitter than Money Orders.

44. The increases under this head to which I beg to call attention are the following:

Canada, United States of America, British Guiana, Barbados, Trinidad, and Grand Cayman.
45. The total Jamaica issues were 2,075 more in number, and £2,040 0s. 10d. in amount than the previous year, while payments on account of the issues of other countries payable in Jamaica were 3,529 more in number and £10,904–13s. 5d. more in amount.

46. Under the head of Orders payable in Jamaica it will be seen that the increase on those cashed on behalf of the United States of America amounts to the large sum of £20,212 in excess of last year,

this is due principally to remittances from the Canal Zone.

47. The proportion of commission which accrued to Jamaica as a result of these transactions is

POSTAL ORDERS SOLD.

49. The following is the total amount of postal orders sold for three years:

50. This displays an increase over last year of £2,912 10s. 6d. showing the extensive use of these orders, therefore although in paragraph 38 of last years report I called attention to this, I think it of sufficient importance to again urge the necessity of issuing every precaution in sending these orders through the post, having due regard to the fact that they are as negotiable as Bank notes.

PARCELS POST.

51. Appended to this report is a comparative statement for the last three years of the Parcels Post transactions. It will be observed that the number of parcels imported into the Colony from the various countries with which exchange exists is 41,887 or 5,601 in excess of last year, the declared value was £41,899 9s. 7d. and the duty assessed being £7,320 15s. 6d.

52. The actual duty collected and transferred to the Revenue department during the year was £7,007 6s. 8d. or £1,171 19s. 10d. in excess of the year 1910-11. This is one of the services rendered

by the department for which no payment is made.

53. The number of parcels insured during the year was 1916 or an increase of 146, while the insured value decreased the amount being £7,063 8s. 8d. or £1,358 18s. 8d. less in value on the importations of last year.

54. The cash on delivery system has shewn an increase, 677 parcels with trade charges amounting to £1,964 1s. 1d. as against 805 parcels and trade charges £1,407 12s. 9d. for last year.

55. The fees collected by the department for the remittance of these collections by money orders and British postal orders amounted to £36–17s. 6d. or £24–4s. 7d. in excess of last year.

56. The following tabular statement of the insured parcels and the cash on delivery parcels shows the transactions under these two heads, in comparison with the period under review, and the year ended 31st March 1911.

57. The amount for fines collected under the regulations on parcels detained as undervalued was £10 19s.

58. The total number of parcels despatched during the year was 11,953 and is 3,742 in excess of last

year.

59. Heretofore parcels under the value of four shillings were admitted free of duty, but since the 27th April 1911 duty has been collected on parcels from the value of 6d. this as will be remembered was purely at the request of the public, and is responsible to some extent for the increase, although the growth of this branch will be observed under all heads.

TELEGRAPHS.

60. Attached to this report is the annual return of messages sent and received the total being, 192,270 as against 134,626 in the year 1910-11, or an increase of 57,644. It will be readily appreciated that this is the result of the reduced rates introduced in January of last year, as well as to the number of offices being increased from 83 to 90.

61. The revenue for this year peing £7,108 14s. 3d. as against £6,942 5s. 1d.½ for the year 1910-11

also shows an increase of £166 9s. 11d, to which reference is made in paragraph 7 of this report.

62. The following amounts were collected on behalf of the Cable Companies doing business in this Colony, and paid over to each of them monthly during the year.
