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The official description of the stamp as "printed on green paper" is wrong. The Deputy Commissioner was no doubt led astray by the fact that some sheets may be found with the surface tinted green, obviously from a plate not wiped quite clean.

Although the official date of issue is as stated, used copies are known postmarked the day before. This could either be caused by genuine usage on this day or through the date of the hand canceller not being changed immediately.
