This Stamp will be put into circulation on 1st November, 1923, and will be sold for $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., the extra $\frac{1}{2}$ d. being for the promotion of Child Welfare in Jamaica.

The following is a description of a $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. adhesive Stamp to be used for Postage and Revenue purposes.

The design of the Stamp, which is in black represents a native boy and girl standing. The Eastern symbol of hygiene "the snake" is shown in the side panels.

The denomination $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. is shown at the top in the left, and right corners, and between is the word JAMAICA.

At the bottom on the left, is the word POSTAGE and on the right the word REVENUE, and between

WELFARE.

The colour of the borders of the Stamp is green.
This Stamp will be put into circulation on 1st November, 1923, and will be sold for 3d. the extra $\frac{1}{2}$ d. being for the promotion of Child Welfare in Jamaica.

The five shilling adhesive Stamp with the Script water mark, will be available to the Public on the 8th November, 1923.
