GREETING:

WHEREAS I have deemed it advisable to issue a Commission appointing the Commissioners herein mentioned and authorising such Commissioners

- (a) to enquire into and report upon the administration of the Post Office Department with special reference to the Parcels Department thereof; the issue of stamps; the provision of effective safe guards for the proper administration of moneys received by the Post Office; the existence of any shortages, or defalcations by officers in connection therewith; and the system of audit and check internal and external in force in the said Department; and
- (b) to enquire into the conduct of any Public Officers concerned in or connected with such system in the Post Office Department; and
- (c) to make recommendations for such alterations as may appear to them advisable or for the introduction of a more effective system.

Now, THEREFORE, Know ye, that I, reposing full trust in your zeal, ability and discretion do hereby under the powers vested in me by Law 8 of 1873 entitled "A Law to enable the Governor to issue Commissions of Enquiry with Special Powers", appoint you the said Sir William Morrison, you the said William Alexander Clarke, and you the said William Edward Owen Turvill to be Commissioners for carrying out the said Enquiry.

And I do hereby appoint you the said Sir William Morrison, Kt., to be Chairman of the said Commission and do direct that any two of you the said Commissioners shall form a sufficient quorum for the discharge of the duties hereby assigned to you.

And I do also direct that having each of you made and inscribed an Oath or Affirmation as required by Law and having deposited the same with the Colonial Secretary you do proceed forthwith to hold the said Enquiry in such manner and at such times and places as to you may seem fit and that, should you find it necessary so to do, you shall summon witnesses to appear before you at such places and times as you may appoint and examine or have them examined before you on oath touching the subject matter of your Enquiry.

And I further direct that your Enquiry shall not be held in public.

And I do further direct you to make a joint report to me as soon as may be practicable of the result of your investigations, transmitting with it the notes of evidence taken by you in the course of your Enquiry.

And I do hereby confer on you all other rights, powers and privileges necessary for the due execution of this my Commission pursuant to the provisions of the said Law 8 of 1873.

And I do hereby enjoin all persons to be aiding and assisting in the furtherance of your Enquiry.

Given under my hand and the Broad Seal of this Island at King's House, Jamaica, this twenty-second day of July in the twentieth year of the Reign of His Majesty King George V, Annoque Domini, 1929.
