

THE TELEPHONE LAW

(Cap. 245)

THE TELEPHONE (AMENDMENT) RULES, 1944

In exercise of the powers conferred upon the Governor in Privy Council by section 9 of the Telephone Law, the following Rules are hereby made:—

1. These Rules may be cited as the Telephone (Amendment) Rules, 1944, and shall be read and construed as one with the Rules made by the Governor in Privy Council on the 5th day of August, 1893 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Rules) and all amendments thereto.

2. The principal Rules are hereby amended by the insertion at the commencement thereof of the following rule as rule 1A—

“1A. These Rules may be cited as the Telephone Rules, 1893-1944.”

3. Rule 2 of the principal Rules is hereby amended in the following respects—

(a) by the insertion after the word “must” where that word appears for the second time in the rule, of the words “if the Governor in Privy Council so requires”;

(b) by the deletion of all the words of the rule coming after the word “indicated”.

4. Rule 10 of the principal Rules is hereby rescinded and the following rule substituted therefor—

“10. The Governor in Privy Council shall consider any objections made pursuant to rule 9 of these Rules and if he thinks fit may direct an enquiry to be held into such objection by such person as he may specify.”
