A PROCLAMATION



HUGH FOOT, Governor

By His Excellency Sir Hugh Mackintosh Foot, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George. Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Island of Jamaica and its Dependencies.

Whereas it is enacted by sub-section 1 of section 3 of The Stamp Issues (Cancellation) Law, 1940, (Law 28 of 1940) that notwithstanding anything in any other law contained the Governor at any time by Proclamation may declare that any issue of stamps shall cease to be valid and in such Proclamation may provide for the cancellation of such issue:

Now, Therefore, I, Hugh Mackintosh Foot, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Island of Jamaica and its Dependencies, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by sub-section 1 of section 3 of the said Law, do hereby proclaim and make known that from the date of the publication thereof in the Gazette

(a) all postage stamps of this Island, the Cayman Islands and the Turks and

Caicos Islands issued in the reign of King George the Fifth
(b) all postage stamps of this Island and the Turks and Caicos Islands issued in celebration of the Coronation of Their Majesties King George the Sixth and Queen Elizabeth

the sixpenny mauve and the one shilling yellow-bistre Salt Raking stamps issued by the Government of the Turks and Caicos Islands

shall cease to be valid and the issue of all such stamps shall be and is hereby cancelled.

Given under my hand and the broad seal of Jamaica at King's House this eighteenth day of June, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, in the fifteenth year of the Reign of His Majesty King George VI.
