THE TELEGRAPH (AMENDMENT) RULES, 1961

In exercise of the powers conferred on the Governor in Council by section 7 of the Telegraph Law, and by virtue of section 9 of the Jamaica (Constitution) Order in Council, 1959, the following Rules made by the Postmaster General under the said section 7 are hereby approved:—

1. (1) These Rules may be cited as the Telegraph (Amendment) Rules, 1961, and shall be read and construed as one with the Telegraph Rules, 1933 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Rules) and all amendments thereto.

(2) These Rules shall come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1961.

2. In rule 1 of the principal Rules—

(a) in paragraph (1) the words “one shilling” and the words “a half-penny” are revoked and the words “one shilling and sixpence” and “one penny” are substituted therefor respectively;

(b) in paragraph (2) the words “one shilling and sixpence” in each place where those words occur and the words “a half-penny” are revoked and the words “two shillings and three pence” in each such place and the words “one penny” are substituted therefor respectively.

3. In rule 4 of the principal Rules for the words “three pence” there are substituted the words “six pence”.

4. In rule 15 of the principal Rules all the words following the word “messenger” are revoked.

5. In rule 28 of the principal Rules the words and figures beginning "The cost for the above" and ending "2½d. postage" are revoked and the following words and figures are substituted therefor—

"The cost for the above would be 2/3d., viz: 13 words, 1/7d. plus 8d. postage."
