Postal exemptions, special rates formally revoked

Several legal provisions which gave low rates and exemptions for the payments of postage to the British armed forces per sonnel formerly stationed in Jamaica, and to the Cayman islands and British West Indies have been revoked.

The provisions revoked under a special proclamation
published in the Jamaica Gasette supplement included
exemptions for the payments
of postage rates by members
of British Naval Forces, the
Army, the British West Indies
special rate of postage, and
the Cayman Islands special
rates of postage.

Mr. Winston G. Brown, acting Postmaster General, said on Saturday that the provisions were revoked as they no longer applied. New regulations for postage had already been in force for some time.

He said that the revocation of the old laws was only a legal procedure.

THE POST OFFICE LAW

(Cap. 301)

The General Post Office (Jamaica Independence Special Provisions)
Regulations, 1965

In exercise of the powers conferred upon the Postmaster General by section 7 of the Post Office Law and of every other power hereunto enabling, the following Regulations are hereby made with the approval of the Minister:—

- 1. These Regulations may be cited as the General Post Office (Jamaica Independence Special Provisions) Regulations, 1965
- 2. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Post Office Regulations 1941, the General Post Office in Kingston shall not be opened for the transaction of public business on the 2nd August, 1965.
