General Post Office, 4th March, 1878. No. 64.

I have the honor to submit the Tenth Annual

Report on the Post Office Department, being that for the Financial Year ended 30th September. 1877.

- 2. The Cash Collection for the year amounted to £14,895 6s. 6d, being less than those for the preceding year (which, as reported at the time, were increased by a special payment of £506 4s 2d received on account of gratuities on Ship Letters carried by the Atlas Line of Contract Steamers between Jamaica and New York.)

The Postal Union referred to was formed (as noted in the last paragraph but one of my last Annual report) by Treaty signed at Berne on 9th October. 1874, between Great Britain and certain other Countries, for the formation of a single Postal Territory for the reciprocal exchange of Correspondence between their respective Post Offices; and Jamaica was admitted thereto on the 1st April, 1877.
