5. The Packet Postages collected on account of the United Kingdom have fallen to the amount estimated at the admission of Jamaica within the Postal Union, leaving a balance of £2,000 between that and the former rate of collection to be provided by Jamaica; but no statement of account or claim under this head has yet been presented by the Imperial Post Office.

6. The item of Inland Postages shews a continuance of the steady increase referred to in my last Report, a result which is confirmed by the figures in the Numerical Return set out below.

12. From 1st April, 1878, the privilege hitherto enjoyed by this Department of remitting on Money Order Account through the Commissariat Chest by Treasury Bills at par ceased, and

a premium of 3 per cent. has since been paid on such remittances.

13. In view of such additional liability which reduced the Jamaica credit on Money Orders issued to 4 per cent., it became necessary to readjust the scale of charges, and His Excellency the Governor was pleased accordingly to authorise a Scale framed on an uniform charge of 6d. in the £ in lieu of the former Scale, which was at the rate of

DISTRICT POST OFFICES,

18. On the 1st December, 1877, a Post Office was established at a place called Trinity Ville, at the head of the Blue Mountain Valley, in the Parish of St. Thomas.

MAIL CONVEYANCE.

(By Railway.)

19. On 5th August, 1878, by agreement within the Jamaica Railway Company, Mail Communication was established by each Train between Kingston, Spanish Town, and Old Harbour. The marked increase in the correspondence between those places shows that the arrangement has been appreciated.

(By Mail Coach.)

20. Although the service did not actually commence within the financial period under remark, it may not be out of place to note that arrangements had been concluded between this Department and Mr. Heron, for the establishment of a Mail Coach Line between Kingston and Mandeville, for the conveyance of Mails, Passengers, and Parcels, and that at the date of this Report the Coach runs with regularity three times a week to and fro between Old Harbour and Mandeville. The rate of charge is moderate, and the public have proved their appreciation of the effort made for their accommodation by patronizing the line to an extent that has already made the experiment a financial success, although the Coach only commenced to run on 4th November, two months since.
