MR. E. L. MORRIS MIGHT BE CONFIRMED AS ASST. POSTMASTER FOR JAMAICA

It is regarded as a certainty that Mr. Eric L. Morris, Acting Assistant Postmaster for Jamaica will be confirmed in the position, Mr. W A. Campbell who held that position until some months ago, having been appointed Postmaster vice Mr.. R. H. Fletcher.

Mr. Morris substantive post in the Department is travelling Supervisor of District Post Offices to which he was promoted more than three years ago, from the First Class grade of Clerks. Mr. Morris joined the Civil Service during the Summer of 1911 as a junior clerk in the General Post Office; nine years later he was advanced to the Second Class; on two occasions thereafter he acted as a First-Class Clerk, and was promoted to that grade :in May 1928. Formerly of the Postal Department and since 1933 of the Government Savings Bank, has been acting as Travelling Supervisor of Post Offices, .in conjunction with branches of the Savings Bank.

Esric Morris Dies at 85

Esric Morris, a former Postmaster General and well-known figure in sporting circles, died on Tuesday at the age of 85 in Canada, where he had been residing since his retirement in the 1950s.

A career civil servant who worked his way up through the service, Mr. Morris rose to the position of Postmaster General in 1945, a position he held for three years.

Later he returned to his alma mater, Jamaica College where he worked as secretary-bursar. At the end of that stint he migrated to Canada with his family.

Mr Morris will be remembered in sporting circles for the contribution he made to as founder of Wembley Club. It was his property at Dunoon Park, that he donated for their use. He himself, played bridge and tennis.

Funeral services for Mr Morris will take place in Canada. He is survived by his wife and two daughters.
