### THE BRITISH ARMY IN JAMAICA

#### 09-02-26 PY2. COMMAND PAYMASTER/JAMAICA

The EKD is actually the date of the proof strike; the handstamp was only sent out to Jamaica on 28<sup>th</sup> November 1920. Not seen used on mail in Jamaica.

# 09-02-26 **PY2A. COMMAND PAYMASTER/JAMAICA** (*new addition*)

A Birmingham-type datestamp reading "COMMAND PAYMASTER / JAMAICA" with the centre showing time, data and year in three lines. Proof strike dated 22 March 1920, but only sent out to Jamaica on 25 March 1920.

Not seen used on mail in Jamaica.

### 09-02-33 AS3A. CARIBBEAN AREA SIGNAL SQUADRON (new addition)

A straight-line handstamp reading "CARIBBEAN AREA SIGNAL SQUADRON" in sans serif capitals measuring  $74 \times 2.5$ mm. The only example seen is struck in purple ink on the back of the cover.

# 09-02-34 OR2B. HEADQUARTERS, ROYAL ARMY ORDNANCE CORPS, CARIBBEAN AREA (new addition)

A boxed handstamp, similar to types OR2 & OR2A, having the same text but in another different font. The first line reads "H.Q. R.A.O.C." in relatively square sans serif font,  $38 \times 4$ mm, the second line having the date, and the lower line reading "CARIBBEAN AREA" in a tall sans serif font,  $39 \times 5$ mm. The frame measures 46  $\times$  30mm, and the two examples seen are both in purple ink. This mark was apparently used alongside OR2 as the periods of use coincide.

## 09-02-35 **OR4. ORDNANCE OFFICER/CARIBBEAN AREA** (*new addition*)

An oval datestamp with the text "ORDNANCE OFFICER" around the top and "CARIBBEAN AREA" offset from the centre at the bottom, all in relatively crude sans serif font. The centre contains the word "DATE" in smaller font and a dotted line, the only recorded example having a date handstamped below the line. The oval contains an ornament at each side, and the outer frame measures  $50 \times 31$ mm. Struck in a grey-purple ink.

Correction: This handstamp, previously noted as a "TRD" was not made of rubber but soft metal faced with copper.

This oval datestamp has been seen on Canadian Army mail (Winnipeg Grenadiers) from June to August 1941.

The newly-reported example providing the EKD is struck in purple ink on a cover to England, and has the date in manuscript in the space provided.

In addition to military mail bearing a Fleet Mail Office handstamp, numerous covers are recorded with the return address on the reverse including "Fleet Mail Office 902" (or F.M.O. 902), and similarly for Fleet Mail Office 901 previously. A cover mailed on 24 December 1941 is possibly the earliest noted for FMO 902. These manuscript FMO addresses are found on mail from both Royal Navy and Royal Air Force personnel on Jamaica.

Although there are no records of British warships being permanently stationed in the Caribbean, Kingston served as a fuelling & repair point for forces in the South Atlantic and those transiting the Panama Canal.

A two-line text handstamp, the first line reading "Officer-in-Charge-of-Armament-Supply." in mixed upper and lower case serif font (70  $\times$

3mm), the second line reading "JAMAICA." in serif capitals. The only recorded example was struck in red ink on the back of a cover to the R.N. Armament Depot on Ireland Island, Bermuda, and is initialled by the sender.

### PRISONERS OF WAR, INTERNEES & EVACUEES

A boxed handstamp reading "PRISONER OF WAR" in tall serif capitals on the first line, and "POSTAGE FREE." in wider serif capitals beneath, all within a single line frame and struck in purple ink. The only example seen is on the front of a cover to Kiel, Germany, which has on the reverse a strike of the RN3 Senior Officer handstamp, a Port Royal double ring datestamp (2 October 1914) and a Kingston machine cancellation of the same date.

A second example of this circular marking has now been found, also struck in purple ink. The Cross Roads double ring datestamp reads 22 December and has no year plug, but the cover is franked with stamps of the New Constitution issue (released August 1945), so the marking must be post-war, whilst the internment camp was still operating (1945 or 1946).

#### 09-05-21 **POW11. RETURNED**

This boxed handstamp reads simply "RETURNED" in large serif capitals contained within a single-line frame measuring 56  $\times$  16.5mm. The only recorded example is on the back of an incoming cover from Germany to an internee, which was opened and returned to the sender. The cover also bears the JCH3 censor handstamps of examiners No.38 and 39, a "Checked No.2" oval mark (POWC4), and was resealed with a carmine on white paper

censor label (JL14). The cover was mailed in Hamburg, Germany, on 16 June 1942 but there are no further datestamps.

Handstamp type JCH1 is also now recorded on POW mail with number 39 as a manuscript alteration of No.1.

New subsection to be added:

#### American Aid for German War Prisoners

Many of the items of mail from the WWII internment camp on Jamaica encountered by collectors are addressed to this organisation at 16 Duerstein Street, Buffalo, New York. American Aid for German War Prisoners was established in September 1940 by Emil Auer, who was German-born but who had moved to the United States as a young man and became a naturalised American citizen in 1931 (Fugger, 2012). The aid operation was based at Auer's home at 16 Duerstein Street. Although initially focussed on providing aid to German POWs held in camps in Canada, the organisation almost immediately also started providing aid to German and Italian prisoners in Jamaica, Australia, Bermuda and Surinam. The donations sent to prisoners included cigarettes, clothing, books and even sports equipment.

When America entered the war in December 1941, Germany became an official enemy and greater scrutiny was inevitably placed on the various aid organisations helping German and Italian prisoners, including American Aid for German War Prisoners. This may be the reason why Emil Auer sought permission from the U.S. authorities in January 1942 to change the name of the organisation, dropping "German", a change that was approved in February 1942. Items of mail from the internment camp in Jamaica show the shortened name being used as early as April 1942, although the original name also continued to be used (probably out of habit and familiarity).

From July 1942 the United States President's War Relief Control Board took over control of war relief efforts and began a programme of streamlining these, drastically reducing the number of organisations involved. American Aid for War Prisoners was able to continue for a while, but on 27 May 1943 Emil Auer's assets were frozen, along with those of the organisation. The permit for American Aid for War Prisoners was officially revoked in late June 1943. During the almost three years that it operated the organisation had shipped around 200,000 aid parcels worldwide.

In addition to envelopes, all types of internment camp stationery (POWPS2 to POWPS5) are found addressed to Emil Auer's organisation (or just to Auer himself after the organisation was closed down); examples of each card are shown later in this section. There is a single recorded example of a card from the organisation to a prisoner in the camp in Jamaica which acknowledges the sending of an aid parcel; it is shown below, front and back. The text notes that the organisation is "sending you today one parcel" in both English and German, with Emil Auer's signature. The card was sent from Buffalo on 8 May 1942 and was censored on arrival in Jamaica by censor number 7 (PC3 handstamp). It also received the POWC4 "CHECKED" oval handstamp (No.2). The handstamp indicating sender address clearly reveals the place where "GERMAN" has been removed from the rubber stamp. In theory samples of incoming correspondence with both sender handstamps should exist.

Another exceptionally rare item is a label reading "PRISONER OF WAR POST! / Postage Free" in red ink. The only known example has a Buffalo machine cancellation dated 12 March 1941 and was used on a cover sent to a camp in Canada. Only a small number of labels were printed (perhaps 50 or 100) and were mostly used on parcels before the local post office requested that



they no longer be used as they were deemed to resemble a stamp. Emil Auer recollected using "perhaps half a dozen" of these labels on covers to Canada, Jamaica and Australia (Harold Krische, pers. comm.\*) with most of the labels being used on parcels.

The survival of a large number of items of mail from POWs in Jamaica to Emil Auer and his organisation must be largely due to the fact that he was a stamp dealer. Items that he received were apparently put in his "25 cent boxes" and subsequently entered numerous collections.

The first row of dots begins slightly to the left of the other three lines. The first and fourth rows of dots are 28 mm apart. Minor variants are found with a large final dot in the line after "NAME" and a slight upturn to the end of the solid line immediately beneath this.

### 09-05-25 POWPS2A. INTERNMENT CAMP, JAMAICA, B.W.I.

The four rows of dots for the address are aligned to the left, and the first and fourth rows are 26-27mm apart.


#### 09-05-25 POWPS3. BESTAETIGUNGSKARTE – ACKNOWLEDGING CARD

Two types of this card are now recognized with different spacing between the top three solid lines on the message side of the card:

Type A: The first three lines are spaced 11.5 mm apart (as shown in Fig.5.19)

Type B: The first three lines are spaced 13.5 mm apart

Work on building Gibraltar Camp only began in July 1940, and the first evacuees arrived in October of that year. Most likely the date plug on the datestamp should have read 1941.



used example is recorded (shown below) sent by the Chaplain of the camp on 30 November 1942. The letter was censored by the postal censorship service in Jamaica.

Also on the front of the cover is struck a boxed registration mark inscribed CFPO 5003 with the registration number "12" added in manuscript. The sender was Captain R. Johnstone of 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron.

This datestamp is of a very similar style to JRU4 but is inscribed "Jamaica Military Stores Depot" around the top in serif lettering, with "Up Park Camp Jamaica" around the bottom in the same lettering. The datestamp is a double ring type, the outer ring being thicker than the inner, with an outer diameter of 40mm. The date is in the centre, as with the other similar types listed, and it has only been seen struck in purple ink. Beneath the date is a manuscript reference number, and the examples seen were sent to the Crown Agents in London.
